- 11) Sir John Swinton, married Lady Margaret Stewart, daughter of King Robert II
- 12) Sir John Swinton, married (2) his cousin, Marjory Stewart, daughter of Robert, Duke of Albany, killed at the Battle of Vernoil in France in 1424
- 13) Sir John Swinton, his daughter Margaret Swinton was married in 1472 to John Falside, John died about 1493
- 14) John Swinton, married 1475 Katharine Lauder, daughter of the family of Bass, John died about 1520
- 15) John Swinton, married in 1518, Margaret, daughter of David Hume of Wedderburn
- 16) Sir John Swinton, married 1552 Katharine Lauder, his cousin, daughter of Robert Lauder of Bass
- 17) Robert Swinton, married Katharine Hay, daughter of William Lord Yester
- 18) Alexander Swinton, married 1620, Margaret, daughter of James Home of Framepath and St. Bothans, Alexander died in 1652
- 19) Helen Swinton married Doctor George Hepburn
- 20) Isabella Hepburn married Mr. William Denune, a man of parts and learning, and being bred to the church, was minister of the gospel at Pencaitland, in East Lothian, where he married Isabella, daughter of Doctor George Hepburn of Moncraig, Esq; by Helen his wife, daughter of sir Alexander Swinton of that ilk, and by her he had one son, George; and several daughters, 1) Christian, married to James Hepburn Congalton Esq; chief of the ancient family of the Congaltons of that ilk in East Lothian, without issue, 2) Mariamne, married to sir John Bruce-Hope of Kinross, baronet, by whom she had one son, John, who died in infancy, and a daughter, Anne Bruce-Hope of Arnot, who is now heir of line of the Hopes of Craighall, Bruces of Kinross, &c. Mr. William's other daughters died unmarried.
